10 THINGS YOU NEVER KNEW ABOUT VETERANS DAY



IT WAS ORIGINALLY CALLED ARMISTICE DAY

Hostilities in World War I ended at the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918 when the Armistice, or peace agreement, with Germany went into effect. Armistice Day began as a celebration recognizing the victory of the allied forces of WWI. It was renamed Veterans Day by President Dwight Eisenhower in 1954 and is now dedicated to veterans of all wars.

ALABAMA HELD THE FIRST KNOWN VETERANS CELEBRATION

The first celebration referred to as Veterans Day was held in Birmingham, Alabama, on Nov. 11, 1947. A World War II veteran named Raymond Weeks, a native of the city, organized the event, which included a parade and other festivities. He was awarded the Presidential Citizenship Medal by President Ronald Reagan in 1982.

THERE IS NO APOSTROPHE

There is often confusion about the punctuation. The holiday is not a day that “belongs” to one veteran (Veteran’s) or multiple veterans (Veterans’), which is what a possessive apostrophe would signify. It is a day for honoring all veterans, so no apostrophe is used.

VETERANS DAY MOMENT OF SILENCE ACT WAS PASSED IN 2016

In 2016, President Barack Obama signed the Veterans Day Moment of Silence Act. At 2:11 p.m. EST each Veterans Day, the current president will order a moment of silence lasting two minutes.

MILLIONS OF AMERICANS HAVE SERVED

According to the Census Bureau, in 2021 there were 16.5 million veterans living in the US, about 6.4 % of the adult population.

16 million Americans served in WWII. In 2022, just over 167,000 of them were alive.

1.8 million served in the Korean War.

2.7 million served in the Vietnam War.

650,000 served in the Gulf War.



ARLINGTON NATIONAL CEMETERY HOLDS AN ANNUAL SERVICE


The cemetery, just across the Potomac River from Washington D.C., is home to the graves of over 400,000 military personnel and their families. A National Veterans Day Ceremony is held at 11 a.m. each Nov. 11. During the commemoration, guards lay a wreath on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and veterans organizations hold a parade of colors. It’s free to attend.

OTHER COUNTRIES ALSO HONOR THEIR VETERANS

Canada and Australia honor their country’s military personnel on Nov. 11. but they call it Remembrance Day.

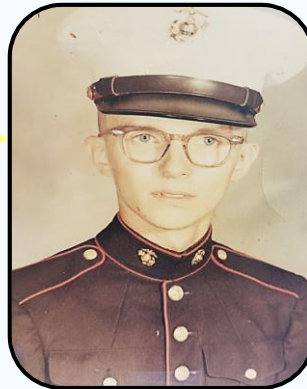
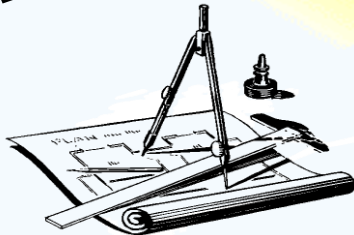


The United Kingdom marks Remembrance Day on the second Sunday of November.



RESIDENT SPOTLIGHT

Richard Klinesmith



Born in Allentown, Pennsylvania, on July 13, 1949, Richard Klinesmith grew up with a love for tradition, family, and craftsmanship. His childhood was filled with fond memories, including meeting Santa Claus and taking joyful trolley rides with his mother to Kutztown. As one of two children, Richard's early years were shaped by the strong values of family and community.

Richard's love for Christmas was something he carried with him throughout his life, rooted in his deep connection to St. Paul's Lutheran Church, where he sang in the choir. His education at William Allen High School, where he graduated in 1968, was the foundation for his early work as an architecture draftsman.

After a brief period in architecture, Richard answered a higher calling and joined the U.S. Marine Corps. He completed basic training in 1970 and served with distinction as a corporal. During his service, Richard was stationed at Marble Mountain in Vietnam, participating in missions that aimed to spread hope and positive messages to the Vietnamese people through leaflet drops. His service also took him to Okinawa, Japan, where he used his skills as a welder and served as an invocation officer. In this role, he ensured the proper functioning and distribution of equipment, while also leading people safely out of base operations.

Following his military service, Richard returned to his roots as an architecture draftsman, a field that remained close to his heart. When the firm he worked for was taken over, Richard decided to move on and took a job at a local hardware store. After leaving the hardware store Richard went on to work for the Allentown Rose Bowl, which kept him close to his passion for bowling. He served as secretary of the Allentown District Bowling Association for 13 years.

Richard's commitment to his church was equally notable. He found joy in teaching Sunday school to second graders at St. Paul's, instilling in young minds the same values that had shaped his own life. His dedication to faith, family, and service was unwavering.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER



[Jesus said] "Hear then the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in his heart; this is what was sown along the path. As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is he who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; yet he has no root in himself, but endures for a while, and when tribulation or persecution arises on account of the word, immediately he falls away. As for what was sown among thorns, this is he who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the delight in riches choke the word, and it proves unfruitful. As for what was sown on good soil, this is he who hears the word and understands it; he indeed bears fruit, and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty." (Matt 13: 18-23)

There's the story of a woman who suddenly stops a man walking down the street and says, "George, I am so happy to see you after all these years! My, how you have changed! You were so tall and now you've grown so short. You were so well built and now you've grown so thin. You had dark hair and now it is so light. Good grief, how you've changed in the last five years! What happened to you, George?" Finally, the man got a chance to get a word in: "But ma'am, my name is not George! My name is Joe." To which the persistent woman calmly replied, "Oh, so you've changed your name too?"

This funny story helps us to imagine how Jesus struggled to be understood, even when he spoke plainly and not in parables. Jesus tells the parable to the people, and then explains it to his disciples. He hopes everyone will listen.

Why does Jesus use this image of a sower who spreads the seed so widely to show how God grows the kingdom in the hearts of others, no matter who or where they are? Imagine Jesus as the sower, scattering the seed all around the plot of land he cultivates, with its combination of deep, rich soil and shallow, rocky soil, its footpaths, and its borders full of weeds and thorns. True, the sower can only plow under the seeds within the soil of the garden, yet he has nonetheless spread the seed to the margins, the edges, the less than hospitable places.

So as Jesus explains later how the four soils represent the various reactions of those who hear the word, he has based this teaching upon the fact that the one who sowed the seed spread it on what we would understand as good and bad soil alike. But to God the Father, it is all good soil, and through his son Jesus, God has spread and given growth to the seed of his kingdom in the least likely places.

In the Bible commentary *Feasting on the Word*, Talitha Arnold writes that we should look beyond what we often see as limitation and frustration in this gospel, of seeing that only a few seeds survive and grow, and instead focus on God's miraculous abundance, that under God's hand those seeds produce a mighty harvest.

In our day, we live so many stresses and challenges and real dangers to our well-being and to the life we once knew. Churches are getting smaller and there is a lessening of Christian influence in our culture. All the years of hard work seems to have fallen on poor soil. But we must remember that God makes good of all circumstances which seem failures to us. God is the one who makes amazing results of something that appears to be dying. We are called to trust God and to be people who persevere in love for God and each other, listening carefully to Jesus' word to us, that all things are in his Father's hands.

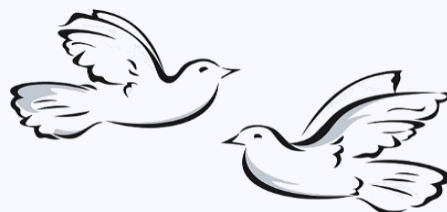

SOUTHERN BUTTERMILK BISCUITS

FOR YOUR THANKSGIVING TABLE OR JUST FOR THE COMFORT OF A FLAKY, DELICIOUS BISCUIT. THIS RECIPE IS SURE TO PLEASE EVERYONE!

INGREDIENTS

2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
3/4 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons shortening
1 cup buttermilk, chilled



DIRECTIONS

- Preheat oven to 450 degrees.
- In a large mixing bowl, combine flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Using your fingertips, rub butter and shortening into dry ingredients until mixture looks like crumbs. (The faster the better, you don't want the fats to melt.) Make a well in the center and pour in the chilled buttermilk. Stir just until the dough comes together. The dough will be very sticky.
- Turn dough onto floured surface, dust top with flour and gently fold dough over on itself 5 or 6 times. Press into a 1-inch thick round. Cut out biscuits with a 2-inch cutter, being sure to push straight down through the dough. Place biscuits on baking sheet so that they just touch. Reform scrap dough, working it as little as possible and continue cutting. (Biscuits from the second pass will not be quite as light as those from the first)
- Bake until biscuits are tall and light gold on top, 15 to 20 minutes.

Flag of the General Assembly

The designer chose white for purity, blue to denote respect for Tennessee, red as the traditional color for America; stars to symbolize the state's three Grand Divisions, East, Middle and West Tennessee.

With Nashville being our monthly travels for November and the GRAND OLE OPRY being one of the top tourist attractions of Tennessee, here are some Fun Facts ya'll might not know.

- The Grand Ole Opry's original name was 'WSM Barn Dance'.
- Uncle Jimmy Thompson was the first performer on the Grand Ole Opry. Thompson, a fiddle player, played live on Nov. 28, 1925. He was 77 years old.
- In 1954, Elvis Presley played the Grand Ole Opry -- and totally bombed. The King of Rock 'n' Roll played "Blue Moon of Kentucky," but his rockabilly sound mixed with his now-iconic pelvic gyrations weren't well received by the audience.
- In 1974, former U.S. President Richard Nixon performed at the Grand Ole Opry. He stopped by to perform "Happy Birthday" and "My Wild Irish Rose" on the piano as a tribute to his wife on her 62nd birthday.
- The Grand Ole Opry has inducted more than 200 members. Membership is not a posthumous honor, but being asked to join the Opry is still considered one of the highest achievements in country music.
- About 6,000 songs are performed live at the Grand Ole Opry each year. The Opry House, which seats 4,400, regularly sells out for performances, and the Grand Ole Opry is one of the top tourist attractions in Nashville.
